

ACKNOWLEDGEMENT

Westwood has had several uniform designs over the years. This current design was introduced in the 1950s. Navy blue tunic with sweetheart neckline on the bodice and gores on the skirt is worn over white shirt blouses with short sleeves.

The uniform is accessorized with hats made of jippi jappa straw, accented with yellow and blue hat bands. It was the custom for students of all-girls and female students at co-ed schools to wear either hats or berets, however, Westwood is the only school that has retained this tradition. In recent years the acronym High Achievers Throughout Seasons (HATS) was introduced as a tagline to engender school spirit.

The school pin is worn on the left shoulder band of the tunic. It is mainly yellow and blue, with gilded lettering and outline, it is a composite of a pineapple above a chevron which is above 4 dots, underscored with the school's motto 'Ora et Labore'.

7. **Reports for 2021-2022**

President Doreen highlighted areas of her report as follows:

The Executives met monthly, general meetings were held with over 50 averages in attendance. In the June meeting, Diane Boreland and Charmaine Jarrett-Barrett (class of 1983) were in attendance and shared the school song which they composed.

In October, Professor Wendell Abel, Consulting Psychiatrist, Head of the Department of Community Health, and Psychiatry, presented on the topic of "Identifying and Overcoming Mental Health Challenges."

Honorable Douglas Orane held a rap session with us on "The Benefits of Building a Stronger Alumnae Association and School Trust." He shared a document with us on "How to Conduct a Fundraising Campaign." This document should be online, if not it will be posted.

The annual church service was held at the Providence Methodist Church in Liguanea. President Doreen Dietrich gave the greeting, Claudine Watkis read the lesson and Rev. Allison Iton presided. Rev. Iton is the daughter of alumna Sybil Iton who passed away last year. The service was live streamed on Youtube and was well attended. A donation of \$15,000 was made to the church and a Zoom reception was held afterwards.

We were able to form 7 working committees, some were linked together -

Hospitality/Membership/Communications, in an effort to stay in touch, particularly with our older members. All platforms were utilized.

We are totally online with all our financial transactions now, thanks to Fiona who donated Quickbooks online. Our audit is completed thanks to Hugh Foster and Associates, who gave their services free of cost.

Our fundraiser for the intercom system at Westwood was successful. The system has been installed and is in use. Our next project, the Enid Beale Building, is our target for the 140th Anniversary Celebrations.

Mentorship Program:

The Mentorship Programme was launched via Zoom on February 8.

School Development and Resources:

We are still awaiting the report on the infrastructure at Westwood.

140th Anniversary Celebrations:

On January 30, 2022, the kickoff service was held in the William Webb auditorium and with WOGA's sponsorship it was live streamed. Several alumnae were in attendance.

Class of 2012:

A session was held with Grades 10-13 and many donations were made to students.

President Doreen congratulated several individuals who had attained achievements and encouraged attendees to share information since this is how it is shared with everyone. She said it was a successful year with an increase in membership and participation as well.

The Current Directors and the Executive Committee were thanked for their service, particularly the financial arm, in getting WOGA to non-profit status. Secretary Jennifer Scott-Lai and Asst.

Secretary Allison resigned in the latter part of 2021 due to personal reasons. Kimberly Ellis was cooped and has provided lovely support.

We were reminded that the 140th Anniversary Gala is for all family members so we should be inviting everyone to attend.

A motion for the acceptance of the report was passed by Claudia Tavares and seconded by Linda Miller.

Kimoy reported that she was referencing an unaudited report therefore it was subject to change. The draft date for this report is March 24.

Westwood celebrated its first virtual school leaving ceremony.

Westwood featured well on the Merit List and the CAPE list and Miss Francis offered high praises for the students.

With regard to the 140th Anniversary Celebrations, a jingle competition was held, a virtual tour of the school was very well received, the appreciation service and many other activities were highlighted.

There are many other activities to be rolled out and there was a sense of excitement and anticipation. Miss Francis shared that the Westwood family had experienced many losses and mentioned the two Grade 9 students who passed away due to cancer. A grief session was held.

PRESIDENT'S REPORT 2022-2023

The Administrative year March 2022 to February 2023 started on a high note as we celebrated the 140th Anniversary of the founding of our Alma Mater. Several activities were held both by the school and WOGA to commemorate this special occasion. Many of the COVID restrictions were lifted towards the end of 2022 allowing us to host our Grand Reunion and Awards Gala in October.

Unfortunately, the year ended with news of a fire in the Knight Dormitory on February 9, 2023, which caused damage to infrastructure and the loss of personal belongings of 8, Grade 11 girls. Members of the Association including WOGA New York immediately spun into action, donating cash and kind. This enabled the girls to replace most if not all the items lost, including textbooks, stationery, uniforms, white dresses, shoes, bedding, toiletries, computers, tablets, casual wear, school bags, luggage among others, so they could return to school and continue their preparations for CSEC Examinations. Four voltage stabilizers were also ordered to serve as charging ports for students' learning devices.

ACTIVITIES FOR THE YEAR UNDER REVIEW

Quarterly and Executive meetings

All meetings have been held using the Zoom platform. The Executive held monthly meetings and General Quarterly meetings were held in June 2022 and September 2022 and in January 2023. The attendance at General Meetings was very good, as on average over 50 members attended from all over the world. At our January meeting our Special Guest, Mrs. Carla Charlton, Beauty Therapist, gave us some useful tips on self-care.

WHS 140th Anniversary

We celebrated the milestones of two centenarians, Janice Robinson in May 2022 and Dorothy Sconce Robertson in August 2022 with visits and presentation of gift baskets. Visits were also made to Elise Robinson (98 yrs.) Etta Whiteman (95 yrs.) and Ruby Whiteman (93 yrs.) who celebrated birthdays.

The Grand Reunion and Awards Gala held at the Hilton Rose Hall Hotel and Spa in Montego Bay, St. James, October 20-23, 2022, was the highlight of the 140th Anniversary celebrations. The event chaired by Beverley Vassell was a dream come true as many anxious moments were experienced during the 2 year long planning exercise due to the pandemic. Approximately 200 Alumnae and their families attended the events planned over the four days. Events included a welcome reception, old hits party, visit to Westwood, an Awards Gala and ended with a church service at the historic Mt. Zion United Church in Rose Hall. The students from Westwood joined us at the church service.

Eighteen Alumnae received awards, seven in the Wall of Honour category for pioneering work done nationally and internationally, eight in the Outstanding Contribution to WOGA/WHS Category and three Special Awards. One posthumous award was given to Kathleen Loffler.

President Doreen expressed her gratitude to the attendees, especially the older ladies from other countries, who came, despite their challenges. There was a good representation of Alumnae from the 1950's to the 2020's.

A Gleaner supplement was published on Sunday November 27, 2022. Several alumnae advertised their businesses and submitted congratulatory messages.

Working Committees

Mentorship and Student Development:

The program started late as Policies about safeguarding must be put in place to comply with the requirements of the Board and the Ministry of Education and meet the school's criteria. The safety of students is a priority, and the team is obligated to ensure that everyone who will be participating is thoroughly screened. The program is being revamped and a new proposal is being written to ensure full compliance. There is a need for an assigned teacher at Westwood to be part of the team. Students' safety is a priority and the committee wants to ensure that the best possible results for the program are achieved. Consideration is also being given to past students who might find themselves in challenging situations and need a mentor.

The class of 1988 provided sanitary napkins for the "period poverty" project on a very large scale as well as assisted students with school fees and other essentials needed. There are also plans in place for a proper scholarship fund for students at Westwood and students transitioning into tertiary education. Bursaries and book grants are other ideas and participation can be the form of year groups, in memory of a person, as a families or individuals.

Fund raising

The refurbishing of the Enid Beale Home Economics Building was chosen as the 140th Anniversary Project.

Plans are still in train to start work in the Summer of 2023. The projected cost for refurbishing and equipping the centre was \$25 million dollars and since then building costs and labour costs have been increased. Approximately \$7 million dollars have been collected to date and there have been promises from several corporate entities as well as individuals for financial support. The Guardian Group contributed a washing machine and dryer.

Thanks to the year groups and Alumnae who have made significant contribution to the project, and we encourage others to make contributions in cash or kind.

The Governance and Finance Committees worked to ensure compliance was achieved with filing for Government regulations at the Tax Administration of Jamaica and The Companies Office of Jamaica and The Department of Cooperatives and Friendly Societies.

The Hospitality and Public Relations Committees were involved in keeping members informed on activities through the various social media platforms and other media such as emails and telephone calls. They played a major role in the activities and preparations for the Reunion and Awards Gala. There is a need for a comprehensive registry of members of the association to capture vital data which will assist in improving its operations.

Appointments to WHS Board

January 2023 saw the appointment of new Board of Directors for Westwood as a three-year Board team began to be chaired by the Methodist Church.

The new Chairman is Rev. Athlone Harrison from the St. Ann's Bay Circuit. Alumnae Doreen King Dietrich and Janett Coore-Farr have been appointed to serve.

WESTWOOD HIGHLIGHTS

MARCH 2022 TO MARCH 2023

140 years of existence is no easy feat of accomplishment. Westwood High School for Girls has stood tall throughout the years, though it has undergone numerous changes since its establishment in 1882. The school continues to graduate batches of young ladies who exhibit dignity and decorum. Westwood High School for Girls has grown from six girls to over eight hundred students and has achieved many successes. In this our anniversary year, the Schools' Challenge Quiz Team reached the Semi- Finals. Equally, despite the Covid 19, our students amassed an average of 93% in the CSEC, 2022 examinations and 94% in the CAPE.

Since March 2022 there has been a flurry of activities with many highs and some lows. We continued our anniversary celebrations, accomplishing many achievements and also experiencing many challenges.

We engaged the students in a blended approach since January 2022 where we facilitated a monthly face to face rotation of each cohort for the Easter Term. For the Summer Term all students returned to face-to-face classes. We were faced with a number of challenges. The lines were very long at the dining room and the tuck shop. The classrooms and dining room were crammed. The students were not able to comfortably have their break as there is no shade at the amphi-theatre where the students have their break.

In early May 2022 there was an outbreak of the Covid-19. Students from the Hostel were sent home as many boarders presented Covid 19 symptoms. Many day girls also presented symptoms and had to be sent home. Some over 52 persons including adults and students were diagnosed with the Covid-19 virus. The team of Inspectors and Public Health Nurses assisted us to manage this crisis. The Ministry of Education and Board Chairman were apprised of the situation. The Head of the Trelawny Health Department Dr. Diahann Dale was very supportive, and we extended thanks to her and the team from the Health Department. The parents were very anxious, and some were quite supportive and took steps to comply in picking up the students without hesitation. We still had parents sending the girls to school if they show signs and symptoms. During that time Nurse McKenzie Wray resigned on June 01, 2022. Nurse Celine Kerr was employed June 08, 2022.

The School Leaving Ceremony, which was originally scheduled for June 30, 2022 was pushed back to July 07,2022 due to the delayed start of the external examinations. Dr. Maurice Smith,

University of the West Indies Registrar/Chief Administrative Officer, Author and International Educational Consultant was the guest speaker. He was excellent. Mrs. Elthia Wilson and Miss Geraldine Allen have proceeded on pre-retirement leave.

There was registration for the PEP students. The Ministry allotted 160 students to Westwood. The Orientation for new students and parents went well. The orientation for returning students also went well. For some cohorts we anticipated more parents.

One hundred and eighty (180) grade seven students are enrolled, and thirty-three (33) grade 12 students have been added to the Westwood family. The total school population was 812 students. We have a total of forty-eight (48) teachers with five (5) new members of staff. The theme for the school year 2022-2023 is "Powered up for Success!" We have been challenged in finding a teacher of Visual Arts, Mathematics and English Language. The school received the CSEC/CAPE 2022 results and for the CSEC examination, the overall average is 93% and for the CAPE examinations 94%. The students earned an overall pass rate of 99% in English A and 79% in Mathematics in the CSEC examination. We congratulate teachers, students and parents for their efforts in preparing the students for this examination cycle.

Highlights of Activities and Students'/Curricular Achievements during the year March 2022-2023

140th Anniversary Celebrations

The 140Th Anniversary Zoomathon was held in March 28, 2022. We raised over \$200,000.00.

The 140th Anniversary Inter- House Quiz Competition 2022 was held in April and Trestrail House won.

We had about 80 Old Girls visiting Westwood in October 2022 and interacted with the students. It was a pleasure hosting our big sisters. The team raised over \$700,000.00 that day.

Students participated in the 140th Anniversary Church Service at the Mt. Zion United Church. Four Sixth Formers attended the 140th Anniversary WOGA Gala Banquet.

The 140th Anniversary Supplement was published in the Gleaner in November 2023.

School Challenge Quiz

Our School Challenge Quiz Team 2022 did very well and in our 140th Anniversary year, superseded last year's team's success, and landed in the Semi-Finals of the 2022 School Challenge Quiz Season. We even played a Master's Match. The members of the School Challenge Quiz team engaged in an early Quiz Rally at Titchfield High School and participated in Quiz Camp in December 2022. SCQ Team 2023- The team won all its matches and reached the quarter finals. We lost the better of two matches to Wolmer's Boys School

WOGANYC sponsored two students (Rajeena Grant 10 and Tiana Brown 11Q) to the virtual Emerging Global Leaders Seminar.

For the first time we had a Sports Camp where we had students of Netball, Track and Field and Table Tennis preparing the various sports for upcoming competitions.

The students participated in the BEBRAS Challenge Competition. Sheanelle Brown of Grade 9 was the Top student in the competition.

The Guidance Department hosted the Careers Day in March 2022. We continued the partnership with May Day High School. We had Rhoda-Moy Crawford as the Guest presenter.

The Modern Languages Department hosted French Day activities which included an Inter Grade 11 French Quiz, Grade 8 French Display and Grade 9 and 10 Video Presentation. The Department hosted its Overnight camp for Oral Practice for the external Oral examinations.

The students participated in the ISSA Table Tennis Championships and our Senior Team emerged Rural Girls Champions. The team moved on to the All-Island Championship but lost to Wolmer's Girls, placing second (2nd) in the island. The Track Team participated in the ISSA Boys and Girls Championships. The team participated only in field events: javelin, shot put, discus and long jump due to the short time for practice. We placed 11th in the javelin and missed out on earning some points.

The Grade 10 students participated in PISA examinations. This is an international examination in which Jamaica participated to see our ranking in the international education arena. The Choir participated in the All Together Sing Competition and did very well. The School Challenge Quiz Team has started practice.

Four students attended a Gender Ambassador Forum at the Caymanas Golf Club. Hale Fearon, a Grade 11 student participated in the Forum and received a certificate of participation.

The Tourism Action Club participated in the Tourism Week activities in September 2022. They produced a video for a presentation at the Forum in Montego Bay.

The students did not attend the Passion and Purity Conference 2022. However, the booklet in which Westwood was featured was launched at the Conference. It had highlights of the Pasion and Purity Conference which was held at Westwood in 2019 and articles from our students.

Two Sixth Formers attended the Grace Kennedy Foundation Lecture.

The boarders participated in the 140th Anniversary Church Service at the Mt. Zion United Church. Four Sixth Formers attended the 140th Anniversary WOGA Gala Banquet.

We also hosted our Prize Giving 2022. Students were awarded for the academic years from 2019-2022. Miss Hanniffa Patterson was the guest speaker.

The Sixth Formers participated in the Junior Mayor Competition. Our own, Shoii-Anne Smith is the Deputy Junior Mayor.

Students of Grade 9 completed their semester examinations. There were incidents of cheating. These incidents are being investigated.

We had our Student Council election. The Student Council President is Natassia Downer and Trev-Ann Cameron, Vice President.

The Sixth Form students hosted their PINK DAY activities in celebration of Breast Cancer Awareness Month.

The Choir performed at the Governor General I Believe Initiative Youth Consultative Forum.

Shoii-Anne Smith copped the top prize in the UWI Caribbean Child Research Competition. Congratulations to her! Danique Haughton placed third while the other students placed from 4th to 9th. We congratulate Mrs. Opal Angus, former Guidance Counsellor, who worked with the girls.

The students of Home Economics attended Harvest at the St. Hilda's Diocesan High School in November 2022.

One Guide and a member of the Gender Ambassador Club attended a prayer breakfast hosted by the Girl Guides Association in November 2023 to mark the International Day for the Elimination of Violence Against Women and Girls.

The student leaders participated in the Virtual Leadership Summit hosted by the Ministry of Education.

A fundraising activity was held on Friday, November 18, 2022 in the form of a Jeans Day with Xtra Vbyz.

The Annual Gift Service was held on Monday, December 05, 2022. We raised over \$170,000.00. Some of the funds were used to assist the indigent in Stewart Town and for the Welfare Fund. We hosted a Christmas Party for the first time since December 2019.

The cadre of student leaders was named and pinned on December 16, 2022. Our Head Girl is Shoii-Anne Smith and Deputy Head Girls are Tiana Brown and Gabrielle Clarke. A virtual leadership training was held on January 04, 2023.

School Spirit Week was celebrated from January 23-27, 2023.

Report Day was Friday, January 27, 2023.

The students from the ISCF attended the Passion and Purity Girls' Conference at the Merl Grove High School on February 18, 2023.

Discipline

Critical incidents have been on the rise. There was a case of alleged sexual abuse committed by the coach. There are cases of students selling sweets, bringing cell phones to school, watching movies during class time, inappropriate behaviour (kissing), piercings, bullying and cyber bullying and in recent times there were two fights and an altercation. The two fights involved the same set of girls. The girls were suspended. There were two instances where students had edibles. In both instances the girls had to be taken to the hospital. Two Guidance Counsellors from St. Hilda's Diocesan High School and York Castle High school assisted us on Monday, February 13 with counselling sessions for the students who were affected by the fire as we did not have any Guidance Counsellors at that time. They also saw other students who had issues. Some of the psychological issues that are trending are cuttings and suicidal ideations.

Science Laboratories

The Science laboratories, though not fully completed, are being used for classes. The outstanding items that were to be completed by February 2023 have still not been completed.

Repairs

The extra plugs were installed in the Staff Room as well as plumbing work was done. The staff room was fitted with new curtains.

Dormitories and teachers' flats were painted.

The Visitors' Lounge at the Karl Fuller hostel was painted and was fitted with a door.

Plumbing work was done at the Karl Fuller hostel, Chevannes bathroom, Nine Miles, Woodlands, Bathroom and the Princess Alice and Knight dormitories.

Some more internet access points have been installed.

The staircase and the verandah of the Main Building were repaired.

A new stove and fryer were bought for the kitchen.

Parts of the Ivin Logan and Etta Whiteman Blocks were painted. Parts of the exterior is still to be completed.

The work at the Main Building has been completed.

The exterior of the Karl Fuller Hostel is being painted.

The patty warmer was repaired.

Lighting fixtures were installed at the L1 &L2 classrooms.

A new point of sale system was put in Tuck shop 2.

Minor repair was done at the McKenzie dorm.

Work to be done:

- > The Principal's flat needs repairs to the roof and closet.
- Staff Room 1 needs to be demolished and reconstructed.
- Staff Room 11 leaks
- > The cupboards at the Domestic Science Lab 2 need to be overhauled.

- > The Housemother's flat and teacher's flat at the hostel need to be repaired.

- > There is an urgent need for another suction fan as it is awfully hot in the kitchen.
